








World's Greatest Shave raises around \$6000







On Friday, 27 June, five amazing students participated in the Leukaemia Foundation's World's Greatest Shave, raising almost \$6000 to support Australians living with blood cancer. This is a fantastic achievement as each donation is vital in helping to support research and for providing care for families.

The concourse was crowded at lunchtime with students and staff showing their support of these committed students and the cause. School Officer Natalie O'Brien, a former hairdresser, was on hand with scissors and shaver to ensure a professional result. Each participating student embraced

the challenge, demonstrating the values of courage, compassion and commitment. These students' positivity and selflessness was a true reminder to us all that acts of kindness and demonstrating empathy have a significant impact on the life of others and bring attention to important issues.

To put the impact these students have made into perspective, the funds raised through their involvement is equivalent to supporting a vital blood cancer research program for an entire day. This kind of support enables researchers and clinicians to fast-track breakthrough therapies and diagnostics from the lab into clinics, making real change possible for Australians living with blood cancer.



















Student Accolades





Year 12 student Ben Bauer has won a Bronze medal in the 2025 International Geography Olympiad (iGeo) held in Bangkok, Thailand. Before he left Australian to participate in the competition, Ben was interviewed by *The Post* newspaper. His answers are below.

Ben Bauer in Year 12 is the only student from WA who will compete for the 2025 International Geography Olympiad (iGeo) competition from 26 July to 1 August. Ben is excited to attend the iGeo competition.

Ben and his teammates from around Australia will compete against other countries in three academic challenges over a week: a written response test, a multimedia test and a fieldwork exercise.

"It is so great to have the opportunity to be the only student from WA attending the competition this year. It's going to be awesome," Ben said. "We will get to do field work in the city of Bangkok, conducting surveys and creating maps, which is one of the greatest ways to experience a new city.

"If the competition goes well, I'll be stoked, but at the moment I'm just looking forward to meeting other people in the competition from different countries."

The program also includes a presentation from each team which showcases a geographic challenge faced by their country, and events where students share cultural traditions and practices.

The annual competition is open to geography students aged 16 to 19 from all over the world, who have enthusiastically participated in the National Geography Olympiads.

In 2025, Lithuania took out first place, with Kazakhstan placing second, Poland coming third and Australia ninth overall.

Modern Minds in Motion: From Rocket Science to Mental Health Advocacy

Taking flight: **Aeronautics Club launches** into model rocketry

Perth Modern School's Aeronautics Club has been diving into the dynamic world of model rocketry, combining hands-on experimentation with technical learning and teamwork.

The term began with students studying the essential components of rockets—nose cones, body tubes, and fins—while exploring the principles of aerodynamics and stability. Armed with this knowledge, members designed and built their own paper rockets, each with a unique configuration. Students tested different fin shapes and nose cone styles to improve flight performance and stability.

To enhance their design process, members were introduced to OnShape, a 3D CAD platform. Using the software, students modelled custom components, particularly nose cones, gaining valuable experience in digital design and engineering.

So far, the Club has held two launch days, with rockets soaring across Beasley Gardens. While some reached impressive heights and others veered off in unexpected directions, each launch offered insight into design flaws and opportunities for refinement.

It's been a term filled with creativity, learning, and high-flying fun—and with more challenges ahead, the Aeronautics Club is just beginning its journey into the skies.

Students from Perth Modern School are pushing hard to raise awareness about good mental health. The students are taking part of the Push-Up Challenge, which is a national suicide prevention campaign. Their efforts are to raise money for Lifeline, a charity that offers crisis support 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Student Sana Khosraviani said the challenge was to remind everyone about the importance of mental health, and remove the stigma around talking about it.

"The Push-Up Challenge doesn't avoid talking about the big questions and raising awareness, including how many people lose their lives to suicide," Sana said.

"I also like the practical information it is spreading, like how much time we should spend in nature a week, which is at least 120 minutes. After finding this out, I walked to my local park and just thought a bit, and afterwards I felt really good."

The students have promoted their Push-Up Challenge on posters and social media.

Perth Modern School Principal Mitchell Mackay said the school community was incredibly proud of the students for their dedication to this cause.

"Their commitment to mental health awareness shows the power of young people to make a real difference in their community,"

The Bloom Future Founders program culminated in a Shark Tank-style pitch event, where students presented their startup ideas to a panel of expert judges:



delivered a gripping and visually arresting production of Animal Farm—a timeless allegory reimagined with striking relevance for today's world.



Mr Michael Rogers leaves behind a legacy of music, mentorship, and humanity.



Visionary Creative Director Fiona Campbell OAM and dynamic conductor Sara Duhig led the charge, crafting a night of pure musical magic.







Linda Black: Judge of the District Court

Modernian Linda Black (1983–1987) was appointed Judge of the District Court following more than 25 years as a top lawyer in the criminal courts. Her appointment to the District Court took effect from August 1, 2022.

Linda was a State Prosecutor at the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions for almost a decade before returning to private practice to specialise in criminal, disciplinary, regulatory and human rights law. She worked as a lawyer for more than two decades with most of that time in the criminal courts defending and prosecuting some of WA's highest profile and complex matters.


Before her appointment as a judge, Ms Black was one of the State's leading barristers and a specialist jury trial advocate. She is an accredited advocacy teacher, one of two founding directors of Murray Chambers Perth and a former President of the Criminal Lawyers Association of WA.

Clive Kendrick: Former Senior Master of Music

It is with great sadness that we acknowledge the passing of Clive Kendrick, a remarkable educator and mentor whose influence shaped the lives of so many at Perth Modern School.

Clive became the Senior Master of Music in 1984, having already made an impact the year before in an acting capacity. His leadership saw the expansion of the Specialist Music program, increasing student intake and introducing a structured three-cycle program of camps, tours and local study years.

One of his most significant contributions was incorporating the Kodály Method into music instruction at Mod, recognising the voice as a powerful tool for musical literacy and collaboration. His dedication to choral excellence enriched the school's music program, fostering an environment where students thrived in their musical development.

Beyond his administrative and educational innovations, Clive was a guiding force for many young musicians, offering support and mentorship that extended far beyond the classroom. His legacy lives on in the hearts and talents of those who had the privilege of learning under his leadership.

Our deepest condolences to Mrs Kendrick and the family. Clive's passing is a profound loss, and his influence will never be forgotten.

John Stone: Former senator and Secretary of the Federal Treasury dies aged 96

PMS student 1941-1945

John Stone, an influential public servant, senator and advocate for free-market policies and smaller government, died recently at his Sydney home.

The exact cause was not immediately disclosed, but the 96-year-old had been diagnosed in recent years with leukaemia.

Secretary of the Federal Treasury from 1979 to 1984, Mr Stone emerged as one of the most outspoken and controversial figures in Australian public life and a hero to political conservatives.

He was so influential in the Fraser Coalition Government, and devised its unpopular "fight inflation first" strategy, that journalist Paul Kelly described him as one of the two men who ran the nation. The other was Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser.

Labor treasurer Paul Keating refused to fire him when the Labor Party was elected in 1983, fearful the loss of the senior economic bureaucrat would damage the new government's credibility.

After famously opposing Mr Keating's decision to float the dollar that year, he left government and supported a campaign by the Queensland National Party to elect Premier Joh Bjelke-Petersen leader of the Federal Coalition.

While the push quickly failed, Mr Stone was elected a Nationals senator for Queensland in 1987, the first and only Federal department head to enter Parliament.

He was appointed shadow finance minister, a position he used to defeat plans by the Hawke Labor government to introduce a national identity card.

As a senator, he mounted arguments that became accepted by both sides of politics and pre-empted the major policy reforms of the Hawke, Keating and Howard governments.

He complained Australia's economy was inefficient. Business costs needed to be reduced, he said, tariffs cut, government businesses sold, the workplace deregulated and more competition introduced into shipping.

An attempt in 1990 to switch to the House of Representatives failed. He spent the rest of his life promoting his beliefs through speeches and articles. In 1992 he founded the Samuel Griffiths Society, a conservative group that continues to oppose what it regards as judicial activism.

In between the Treasury and Senate, he co-founded the H. R. Nicholls Society, a group that became the intellectual home of industrial relations deregulation.

"John was perhaps our most prominent contrarian: someone who exposed the orthodoxies of the day to withering and fearless scrutiny, saying what he believed needed to be said but that almost no one else would," wrote former Prime Minister Tony Abbott, who hired one of his sons, Andrew, as an economic adviser.


Forceful debater

Living in Sydney's lower north shore, Mr Stone attended a regular lunch hosted by Greg Lindsay, the founder of the Centre for Independent Studies free-market think tank. At his last appearance, in April, he appeared weak but alert.

He was a forceful debater with a soft side who would sometimes contact opponents and apologise for hurting their feelings.

Born to a West Australian wheat farmer from the town of Korbel, he went to Perth Modern School and the University of Western Australia, where he graduated with first class honours in mathematical physics.

Attending Oxford University on a Rhodes Scholarship, he switched to economics. He joined the Treasury in 1954 and became deputy secretary in 1971. Over the following years he saw the devastating political consequences for the Whitlam Labor government from its inability to control inflation, an experience that contributed to his fiscal conservatism.

"Whatever your view of John Stone's legacy, there's little doubt that modern Australia would benefit from a few more like him: clear in purpose, anchored in conviction, and unafraid to challenge consensus when it counted," Mr Lindsay said.

John is survived by five children. His wife of 70 years, biologist Nancy Enid Stone, died of pancreatic cancer in 2023.



It's been a fantastic example of active, hands-on learning, combining physical activity and skill development with a healthy dose of fun. Well done to all our Year 10 surfers!


